Incidents in the Outdoors: Psychosocial Incident types

Number of incidents by severity

Actual severity is based on the response to the event and the outcome. Potential severity is based on the reporter's subjective perception of the most likely or probable outcome should a similar event occur in the future.

Example Incident types:

Bullying, abuse, anxiety, homesickness, inappropriate interactions with other group members or public, distress, stress, or conflict.

Federal/State Government

Time to adapt to changing legislation (2).

Program

Program suitability (10) for the participant's mental or physical capacity.

Participant

Mental/Physical (249) condition including: anxiety, depression, phobia, mental or physical capacity, pre-existing mental health condition, homesick, stress, or panic attacks.

Schools / Parents

Communication (61) regarding:

- pre-existing mental health conditions and the severity of the conditions.
- person's current mental state and recent patterns of behaviours.
- Management of pre-existing conditions.

Management

Knowledge (3) about the severity of the pre-existing medical condition.

Other People

Attitudes (9) towards other members of the group.
Inappropriate communication (7) with members of the public.
Decisions (7) to act in a unsafe or inappropriate manner.

Group

Peer interactions (55) including bullying, competitiveness, or peer pressure.

Supervisor / Leader Communication

Communication (38) with supervisors and/or participants, Communication regarding expected behaviours and providing instructions.

Knowledge (34) of participants pre-existing medical condition, behaviour patterns, or behaviour management plan; Leader's skills and training to manage behaviours.

Resources / Environment

Inappropriate use of **equipment (23)**, including matches or knives.

Weather (34) conditions, including temperature or rain.
